Jesus the Lamb of God

"Behold the Lamb of God, which taketh away the sin of the World." John 1:29

The Book of John 1

"In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. The same was in the beginning with God. All things were made by Him; and without Him was not any thing made that was made. In Him was life; and the life was the light of men." ~ John 1:1-4

John 1:1-4 establishes Jesus Christ (the Word) as the Creator who brings life and light to humanity, revealing His identity, relationship with God, and pivotal role in salvation.

Who is John in the "Gospel of John"?

In the Gospel of John, there are two key figures named John:

John the Baptist a prophet who prepared the way for Jesus Christ's ministry. He baptized Jesus in the Jordan River and testified that Jesus is the Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world (John 1:29).

John the Apostle (John son of Zebedee): This is the author of the Gospel of John. He was one of Jesus' twelve disciples and is often referred to as "the disciple whom Jesus loved" within the Gospel itself (John 13:23; 19:26; 20:2; 21:7, 20). He wrote the Gospel of John to emphasize Jesus' divinity, His role as the Savior of the world, and the importance of faith in Him for eternal life.
